The appointment of a new Deputy Headteacher is already underway and hopefully both with be appointed before we break for Easter. Year 8 Dodgeball Competition

KS3 Netball Club— Every Monday after school various pupils from years 7,8 and 9 attend the Netball Cub, which has been run by the Year 11 Sports Leaders since September. Over the course of the weeks, we have covered many different rules, positions and skills, some of these include footwork, driving into receive the ball, shooting techniques, defending and much more. Usually on a Monday after school the children will take part in a range of activities including drills, shooting games and matches. Every student that has attended has shown great enthusiasm for the sport and has improved massively since September. Everyone is also great at listening, following instructions and willing to play and try out positions they are less comfortable with. Due to their hard work in training, the pupils have been able to represent school in matches and competitions against local schools, where in many cases they have won and shown great teamwork. In lessons.....

This half term pupils have covered three different sports in PE: Badminton, Fitness and Table Tennis. In badminton KS3 pupils looked at the different serves in badminton and the rules of serving; how to do an overhead clear shot and an introduction to the importance of adjusting power and the rules of a game. The year 9s also looked at the drop shot and the tactics of using this shot. In KS4 pupils looked at the serves and recapped the rules, recapped the drop shot, overhead clear and net shot and began to work on the power in their smash shots. Both KS3 and 4 looked at these elements through singles and doubles and the difference between the two

We then moved on to fitness and looked at various fitness tests and why they are used. Each class started off with the individual bleep test and everyone tried really hard. A big well done to the top three students in Girls PE

- 1. Lyla Duffy = Level 12.1
- 2. Tilly Duffy = Level 11.6
- 3. Alice Carr = Level 10.9

After this each class went on to do the group bleep test where pupils then work in groups to try complete the full test. The rule is that as long as someone from the group is running to the beep pupils can split the beeps/levels between them and work as a team. Well done again to all pupils as everybody worked really hard at this. In particular the year 11 group who did not miss any beeps and they managed to run each beep in time - Libby Cowking, Maddie McFadden, Gracie Wilson and Zoe Johnson.

For the last two fitness sessions each class performed a lesson on circuit training which they enjoy as it is to the music. Year 7, 8 and core PE did a set circuit whilst year 9 and Cambridge National students could use their creativity and adapt each station to an exercise they created. The last fitness session consisted of completing the 12 minute cooper run with a big 'well done' to Alice Carr who achieved the furthest distance ran in 12 minutes out of all the girls.

For the last week of the term Girls PE finished with table tennis where we looked at the serving rules and technique, the fore hand and back hand, and rules of singles and doubles.

Pupil Review of WAITRESS

My Review Of: 'Waitress'

This is my review of 'Waitress'. I went to see it on Saturday 14th May 2022 in Liverpool and I enjoyed it as well as critiquing it. The story follows the life of a Waitress called Jenna.

The reasons I liked the musical were:

- * Harmonies in some songs (vocal and instrumental)
- * Singing
- * Choreography
- * Style of music
- * How the difficult scenes were choreographed
- * Jenna and Earl having their own musical motifs
- Comedy
- Facial expressions and body language immersed the audience into the fantasy world
- * The acting in general

What I didn't like about it:

- * The song 'Me And You' because of how the characters sang , the split/staccato sound between the words 'me' and' and' wasn't articulated properly so it sounded like they were singing 'meand' which doesn't make any sense
- * Articulation from the character of the owner who was the old man, the microphone lost a few words of dialogue so I didn't fully understand what was going on sometimes.
- No vibratos from Jenna where there should have been to make it more interesting
- * People not keeping characters while heading offstage (in the dark, near the wings, sometimes rushing which ruined the atmosphere)
- * Café was too consistent (the same people were sat in the same outfits in the same places, occasionally moving for leads and supports and it was always full)

She Used To Be Mine -

It's one of my favourite musical theatre songs, and the performance and vocals were excellent because she portrayed the emotion so well through acting. The first line of the first chorus was delayed (which I wasn't expecting) and it might have been used for the emotion and initially I found it annoying, weird, and different but later I realised that it's good that I got to experience a different version of it. During the song, someone laughed but Jenna just ignored it and it made me realise that she is truly committed to performing like so many others, and for me, I love it because I feel passion and get a certain feeling when I'm onstage doing what I love, which leads me onto the thing I'm going to talk about next.

When I was really young, I remember seeing Amanda Seyfried playing Sophie in 'Mamma Mia' multiple times , and for years she was my favourite actress. As I got older, I decided I wanted to go into acting as a hobby, dream, and possible career path and so when Christmas was coming up in 2016 one of the items I wanted was acting classes and that's how I joined Valley Academy. We do quite a lot of shows and concerts and we performed 'West Side Story' in March; I'd forgotten how much I love being onstage because nothing compares to the feeling I get , and 'Waitress' made me love acting even more because it reminded me of the adrenaline rush just before the opening curtain lifts.

All in all, it was a brilliant production with good quality acting, marvellous music and singing, and a fantastic storyline. It was a memorable night for me because it gave me a chance to escape reality but also giving me an opportunity to use it for this review. I preferred it to 'And Juliet' because it was more laidback with more realistic issues. I also liked the fact that it was all original songs. Although I did find things that could be improved with 'Waitress', I'm glad I got to go and see it because it was on a list of shows I want to go and see and that was one of them. However, it wasn't just a case of ticking it off a list, it was more than that. People act for different reasons, and the truly committed ones never do it for the money, there's always some authenticity woven between the threads.
